Combustible cladding crisis

# Combustible cladding ignited in Canberra apartments fire



Residents of a Canberra high-rise apartment building avoided potential tragedy this month when a smouldering cigarette ignited combustible cladding on the wall and balcony of a second-level unit.

Five firefighting vehicles rushed to Glebe Park Apartments on the afternoon of August 7 after the cigarette butt set fire to a cloth-covered sofa on the apartment balcony and the fire spread to the 100 per cent polyethylene-core panels on the building at 15 Coranderrk Street.

"This fire was partially extinguished by civilians using a fire hose reel from outside at ground level," an ACT Fire & Rescue spokeswoman said on Wednesday.

"ACT Fire & Rescue crews fully extinguished what remained of the fire on the balcony within 18 minutes of the initial call at station."


Local media have reported the fire, but the presence of combustible cladding has not yet been disclosed. Fire authorities referred questions about the building's

cladding to the developer and builder. Developer Amalgamated Property Group did not respond to a request for comment.

The extensive use of cladding of the sort used on London's Grenfell Tower, and Melbourne's Lacrosse and Neo200 towers makes fire a serious risk at the 184-unit, eight-storey building developed by Amalgamated in 2009. But the incident also highlights the lack of knowledge in the nation's capital about the extent of combustible cladding on privately owned buildings.

Canberra Airport is also clad in 100 per cent PE-core panels.

The ACT government began an audit of cladding-affected buildings in 2017, but that review focused only on 240 government-owned buildings. Unlike state governments in Victoria, NSW and Queensland, it has not yet compiled a list of private buildings.



"The Review Group is currently considering the different approaches taken in other jurisdictions in relation to the audit of private buildings containing potentially combustible cladding," ACT Building Minister Gordon Ramsay said on Wednesday.

"The government will consider feedback from insurance agencies, other jurisdictions and other bodies and provide an update by the end of the 2019."

Mr Ramsay referred questions about the Glebe Park Apartments fire to the ACT's Emergency Services Agency.

Video footage of the fire obtained by *The Australian Financial Review* shows it burned on both sides of a balcony partition separating two apartments. It could have been disastrous if two barbecue gas bottles on the burning balcony had ignited. It is the first known cladding-related blaze on a residential building in the ACT.

The *Financial Review* has previously reported that state and territory building ministers agreed in 2010, after ACT regulators reported concerns of their own fire authorities about the panels, to draft an advisory note warning the building industry that 100 per cent PE-core panels would not meet building code standards, but the advisory never happened.

In 2012, the Australian Building Codes Board rejected a proposal to change the rules by suppliers Alucobond Architectural and SGI Architectural.

"The proposed changes would have the potential to dilute the prescriptive measures of the code," ABCB chairman John Fahey said.



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

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
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
